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BUDGET PRESENTATION

Councilman Sherry, in this Budget Presentation, outlined the main reasons for the \$1million increase from last year's budget. The reasons are the addition of a police officer, contractual employee benefits, new debt for infrastructure projects in the town and mandatory minimum wage hike. The whole budget, along with additional information, such as charts, comparing tax rates, as well as costs associated with our most expensive services- police and highway, compared to neighboring peer communities- can be found on the Town's website.

PUBLIC HEARING

Local Law 2017-18 – Amending §144-31(A)(46)A Unmanned Air Craft Take-offs & Landing

At 7:40 PM (local time) Supervisor Keem called for the Public Hearing to hear all interested parties regarding proposed Local Law 18 Amending §144-31(A)(46)A Unmanned Air Craft Take-offs & Landing –established in General Municipal Law §3-c.

Affidavits of Publication and Posting of the Legal Notice of the Public Hearing were presented, read aloud, and filed with the Town Board by the Town Clerk.

The following came forward to speak

Frank Zbytek – Mr. Zbytek is a model airplane enthusiast who is concerned that the new local law will impact his hobby. He belongs to the American Model Association, and stated there is a long list of rules that need to be followed by people who fly model aircrafts. There is also a Section, #336, that is a special rule for model aircraft that protects them from new and overbearing regulations. Mr. Zbytek said most model aircraft hobbyist are upstanding people.

Donald Robinson is a fellow drone enthusiast and stated there are newer models of drones coming out that have geofencing which limits the areas drones can take off and land. FAA may soon force drone owners & manufacturers to update their equipment with geofencing. He would like the Town to take a step back from this legislation, so the owners and companies can do their updates.

WHEREAS, following due and timely notice a public hearing relating to the matter of Local Law 18 of 2017 was conducted, at which time all interested parties were given an opportunity to speak.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it

RESOLVED, that the Town Board is hereby authorized to adopt Local Law #18 of 2017 which provides as follows:

Amending the above captioned \$144-31(A)(46)A to add:

SECTION 1: §144-31(A)(46) A. Unmanned Air Craft Take-Offs and Landing

i. It shall be unlawful for any person to take off or land in any zone within the Town of Orchard Park an Unmanned Air Craft or Unmanned Air Craft System within one (1) mile of and within two (2) hours before or after an open air event sponsored by the Town of Orchard Park and located within the Town of Orchard Park such events including, but not limited to: parades, concerts, street dances, festivals, art shows, sporting events and recreational events.

It shall be unlawful for any person to take off or land an Unmanned Air Craft or Unmanned Air Craft System within two (2) miles of the New Era Field Complex on the day of any event held at the New Era Field Complex and four (4) hours prior to or four (4) hours after any event held at the New Era Field Complex.

- iii. Definitions:
 - (c-i) Unmanned Aircraft means:

(1) a device that is intended to navigate in the air without an onboard pilot and

(2) an aircraft that is operated without the possibility of human intervention from within or on the aircraft. Unmanned Aircraft are also referred to as "drones."

(c-2) Unmanned Aircraft System means an Unmanned Aircraft and associated elements (including communications links and the components that control the unmanned aircraft) that are required for the pilot-in-command to operate safely and efficiently in the national airspace system.

- (c-3) New Era Field Complex means all of the approximately 197.65 acre parcel of land situated in the Town of Orchard Park, New York locally known as One Bills Drive inclusive of New Era Field, the ADPRO SPORTS Training Center, the Fieldhouse, parking lots, entrances, walkways and practice fields.
- iv. Exceptions Express written permission required: The takeoff or landing of an Unmanned Aircraft or Unmanned Aircraft System as proscribed herein may be permitted pursuant to written permission issued by the Town of Orchard Park. This permission, when issued, will be subject to all applicable Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) regulations.

SECTION 2: This local law shall take effect upon filing in the Office of the Secretary of State or from the date of its service as against a person served personally with a copy thereof.

Councilman Sherry stated that this code does not affect anything the two gentleman talked about, in fact all this code does, is for a few hours a year, in a very narrow confined area, restrict taking off and landing of drones, it is not an issue of rebels, spying, or coming out against responsible operators, this is strictly a safety issue intended to protect large crowds. The code was crafted in consultation with several attorneys from the FAA.

The resolution was unanimously adopted.

With the current work load, the Engineering Department does not have the manpower at this time to complete the work to meet the project schedule, and

WHEREAS, the submittal outlines the detailed scope of work and fee schedule proposed. Professional services are to include Private Roadway and all Utility Design Work including the agency permitting procurements for the private access roadway, culverts, box culverts building and drainage appurtenances. Utilities include the design of water line, electric service, natural gas, telecommunication services as well as coordination of all involved agencies, and

WHEREAS, they will provide an updated Master Plan for the Brush Mountain Park Site including a matrix of projects, tasks, user group activities and that interfacing. Construction documents for competitive bidding and construction management services are also included in the proposal. Additional work included as directed by the Town Board includes Wetland permitting and relocation of the stream, site value engineering, and reimbursable expenses.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it

RESOLVED, that the Town Board does hereby approve the change order #1 to our contract with Wendel WD Architecture, Engineering, Surveying & Landscape Architecture, P.C. Centerpointe Corporate Park, 375 Essjay Road, Suite 200, Williamsville, NY 14221, to provide professional services for the Brush Mountain Community Activity Center Civil/Site Design & Agency Permit Procurements in an amount not to exceed \$205,000.00, as recommended by the Town Engineer.

11) THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION WAS OFFERED BY COUNCILMAN MAJCHRZAK, WHO MOVED ITS ADOPTION, SECONDED BY COUNCILMAN SHERRY, TO WIT:

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WHEREAS, per capital project meetings and budget submittals, the existing Sewer, Water and Lighting backhoe needed to be replaced. The Sewer Department has been using a 1995 Case 580 Super L backhoe loader to complete excavations for sewer repairs, water installations, street light repairs, landscaping projects and snow removal. When this aging backhoe suffers mechanical breakdowns, the entire Department's operations are severely affected. This machine is over 22 years old but still has a respectable trade in value of \$17,000.00. The Backhoe will be listed on Auction International Ad, but if the bids are lower than expected or trade in, it will be traded in, and

WHEREAS, for the Department's future efficient maintenance of the Town's ever growing infrastructure, a new backhoe loader with additional lifting capacity is necessary for the Department to continue to deliver the expected services our residents demand. The new machine will give the Department the ability to safely install the precast concrete light bases that taxed the old machine beyond its limit, and

WHEREAS, several manufacturers were looked at, with an equipment proposal being obtained for a 2017 Case 580 Super N backhoe loader. The backhoe can be purchased from Monroe Tractor under the National Joint Powers Alliance (NJPA) municipal pricing option. The NJPA pricing for the new machine is \$105,903.00, the NJPA municipal price is \$95,480.00 and the trade value of the Town's 1995 Case Backhoe is \$17,000.00, and

WHEREAS, there is presently funds allocated under capital projects H56 "Water/Sewer Equipment Acquisition" and General Equipment, Equipment Repair and Electric Equipment Lines for this purchase.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it

RESOLVED, that the Town Board does hereby declare the 1995 Case 580 SL as surplus equipment and approve the purchase of a new 2017 Case 580SN backhoe loader from Monroe Tractor, 5035 Genesee Street, Buffalo, NY 14225, under NJPA municipal pricing for a balance of \$78,480.00 with trade in for the Orchard Park Sewer, Water and Lighting Department, as recommended by the Town Engineer.

The resolution was unanimously adopted.

New Business #5 Town Board to Support a Home Rule Request to amend Erie Co. Tax Law

12) THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION WAS OFFERED BY SUPERVISOR KEEM, WHO MOVED ITS ADOPTION, SECONDED BY COUNCILMAN MAJCHRZAK, TO WIT:

WHEREAS, since 2015 more than 800 homes in Western New York have been deemed "zombie houses" defined as properties undergoing the foreclosure process that can remain vacant for years; and

WHEREAS, the economic result of such vacant properties is nearly \$58 million worth of real estate in Erie County since it was last calculated; and

WHEREAS, if the home remains vacant for a long enough period of time the property value could decrease to such a level that it is no longer in a bank's financial interest to foreclose on the property implying that time is a crucial factor in these cases; and

WHEREAS, these houses remain empty typically due to homeowners' misunderstanding of proper foreclosure procedure - leaving these houses in limbo, i.e. the homeowners no longer maintain the property and banks are not legally obligated to. This means these properties are maintained oftentimes at the expense of the taxpayers; and

WHEREAS, in the United State the average time it takes to foreclose on a property is two years. If a house has been deemed abandoned by the municipality the foreclosure process should take one year; and

WHEREAS, as such the Town Board of Orchard Park requests permission from New York State to make the following amendments to the legislation known as the Erie County Tax Act; and

WHEREAS, the purpose of this resolution is to recommend the New York State Senate and Assembly amend § 9-1.0 of the Erie County Tax Act to shorten the period in which the holder of a tax sale certificate may foreclose on a property that is certified by a municipality to be vacant and abandoned from two years to one year; and

WHEREAS, additionally to recommend § 11-2.0 of the Erie County Tax Act be amended to shorten the period in which the county may foreclosure on a tax certificate on a property that is certified by a municipality to be vacant and abandoned from two years to one year.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, the Town of Orchard Park recommends to the New York State Senate and Assembly that they amend §9-1.0 of the Erie County Tax Act to shorten the period in which the holder of a Tax Sale Certificate may foreclose on a property that is certified by a Municipality to be vacant and abandoned from two years to one year, and be it further

RESOLVED, to additionally recommend that §11-2.0 of the Erie County Tax Act be amended to shorten the period in which the County may foreclose on a Tax Certificate on a property that is certified by a Municipality to be vacant and abandoned from two years to one year, and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Clerk of the Town of Orchard Park forward certified copies of this resolution to the New York State Assembly, attention Carl E. Heastie, and New York State Senate, attention Majority Leader Flanagan, as well as to the Erie County Executive, Mark Poloncarz, and to all other parties deemed necessary and proper.

Supervisor Keem stated this legislation supports making foreclosures happen quicker. Currently when a property is declared vacant, it is a two year time frame for it to go into foreclosure, and now we are going to cut that to one year, as other communities in this area are doing.

The resolution was unanimously adopted.

New Business #6 Closure of Capital Project – Forest Avenue Bridge

13) THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION WAS OFFERED BY COUNCILMAN MAJCHRZAK, WHO MOVED ITS ADOPTION, SECONDED BY COUNCILMAN SHERRY, TO WIT:

WHEREAS, the Town has completed project H68 – Forest Avenue Bridge, and

WHEREAS, the Town has also received all State and Federal aid associated with the project, and

WHEREAS, the Town now has cash available in the amount of \$887,141 from grant proceeds, and

WHEREAS, the Town has identified the original funding source of H68 as the 2015 Bond authorized for "Forest Drive Bridge" (Original BAN issuance 10/24/12), and

WHEREAS, the Town has ascertained that it is required to utilize the excess cash against the 2015 debt payments referenced above,

NOW, THEREFORE, be it

RESOLVED, that the Town Board authorizes the close of capital project H68 – Forest Avenue Bridge and transfer of excess cash in the amount of \$887,141 to the Highway Fund, where it will be restricted for payments of the 2015 debt, specific to the Forest Avenue Bridge project.

The resolution was unanimously adopted.

New Business #7 Closure of Capital Project – Municipal Center Renovations

14) THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION WAS OFFERED BY COUNCILMAN MAJCHRZAK, WHO MOVED ITS ADOPTION, SECONDED BY SUPERVISOR KEEM, TO WIT:

WHEREAS, the Town has completed project H88- Municipal Center Roof and Renovations, and

WHEREAS, the project has a deficit cash balance of \$21, and

WHEREAS, the Town has determined that the General Fund will provide additional funding to close out the project.

RESOLVED, that the Town Board authorizes the close of capital project H88 – Municipal Center Roof and Renovations by transferring cash in the amount of \$21 from the General Fund within transfers out.

Supervisor Keem said last Tuesday was Election Day and he commended all those who came out to vote. He also wanted to thank all the people who supported him in this election, it is an honor and privilege to serve the people of Orchard Park.

Councilman Majchrzak thanked the residents who voted for him, he looks forward to serving the community.

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Chief Pacholec addressed the issue regarding the drone legislation. He has been involved with drone and counter drone operations for four years and is on the state panel that sets up the curriculum for law enforcement and training. There has been six incidents at the stadium and one was when a drone crashed in the upper deck of the stadium. It was not a malicious act, the owner lost control of his drone when the battery died, fortunately there were not many people left in the stadium. His concern is public safety as recent incidents out west have proven, the greatest amount of injuries came when panic ensued. If one of these crashes in the stadium, the amount of people who will be hurt, or worse, could be devastating. Chief Pacholec said he is familiar with geofencing, and it is not as robust as you think. It doesn't always work. As Councilman Sherry had stated, they have met with the FAA and their attorneys regarding this legislation. The issue is public safety.

Chief Pacholec said the Police Department is sponsoring a car seat check at the Orchard Park Central Fire Hall on December 6, 2017 from 5pm to 8pm. On December 4, 2017 the Police Department is partnering with the Orchard Park School District for a Police Information Night with parents at 7pm. The topics are going to be Social Media issues, cyber bullying, public perception of Police, Police interactions, and youth issues as they related to drugs and e-cigarettes.

Highway Superintendent Piasecki said the leaf pickup is still underway, and will continue, and the plow trucks are all ready to roll when needed.
